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Program Overview

In-School Small Group Mentoring

Right Moves For Youth (RMFY) is a schoolbased, youth development and student support program helping students develop the skills to succeed in school and in life.

4-Pillar Model

- Educational Attainment
- Social-Emotional Well-Being
- College & Career Readiness
- Leadership & Civic Duty

Key Outcomes:

- Place of belonging and connectedness
- Improve social and emotional well-being
- Increase high school graduation rate and having a plan after high school
- Increase experiences and life skills



Examples of Curriculum Topics:

- Coping strategies
- Confidence and Character
- Decision-making and avoiding triggers
- Increasing positive throughts about themselves
- Student futures beyond high school



Ambassador Leadership Program

Ambassadors is an out-of-school time leadership development program by application only for up to 30 students. Each year a new project focus is picked, such as financial literacy, podcasts, nonprofit and community programs, etc, in partnership with subject matter experts. Students are led in a monthly exploration of a leadership or civic duty topic which culminates in small group presentations and a 3-day service learning trip.





Impact Stories

"A lot of kids like me"



Brandon found friends in Right Moves For Youth who aligned with his own values.

n 8th grade, a classmate in Right Moves For Youth suggested Brandon consider joining the after school program. Brandon was a student at Whitewater Middle School and his RMFY Program Specialist Mr. Gibbs agreed he'd be a good candidate for the program. "A lot of the kids were kind of like me, so I was like, 'Hey, you know what? There are a lot of kids who are basically kind of like me,' so I was like, 'Okay, well, I'm going to be over here with these guys.'"

Brandon's mother, Nerissa, says Brandon was always quiet, a bit shy, and steered clear of other kids involved in drama or trouble.

Nerissa says Right Moves For Youth has given Brandon a place to be his own person, find his voice, and create an identity with a supportive community. "Just being his mom alone makes me proud. But I feel like some of my proudest moments came from him being a part of this program," Nerissa explained.

"I'm grateful that he was chosen, and I see so much difference in him. This program has really given him the opportunity to step out and try and think, and honestly, I feel like without this program, he probably would still be kind of laid-back, kind of reserved. But now, him doing this, it has taught him so much, and he's more outgoing. He's always been a great kid, but RMFY program has definitely shown him so many things and given him so many opportunities that a lot of kids just don't really get all the time. So I'm grateful for the program."

"This is what Right Moves does. It made me more understanding, too, because Right Moves just got me on stage a lot, so I say, yeah, that's what Right Moves did. It changed my life, but it made me realize that it's okay to be different. You just got tojust don't feel ashamed of it, because I get put down a lot, but

I don't care."

Brandon said Right Moves For Youth leaders and mentors understand young people, create a space where they can express themselves, and support the unique ways each young person shows up. He excelled so much in his second year of the program he was selected as an Ambassador of Excellence. "They talk to you like an adult. They know that you can figure things out. They know that you're smart enough to know what's right for you. They're just kind of supporting you in figuring it out," he said.

As Brandon looks forward to his Sophomore year and considers what extracurricular activities he'll get involved in, he and Nerissa know Right Moves For Youth will be one. "They're preparing him for the real world. They're my support system. They're helping him, guiding him through the world. Showing him so many things. Like, those college tours that they go on, you know, I'm going to be honest, I'm a single parent, I would love to do some of those things, but some of those things that I just can't do."

"I feel like it definitely helped him, like, social and emotional," Nerissa explains. "I remember I said to him, 'Brandon, you spent your freshman year being by yourself. Can you try to talk to somebody sophomore year?' And he said, 'Listen, I'm not talking to anybody that we don't have anything in common.' He said, "Interest matters I'm not going to force anything.""

Nerissa smiles as Brandon confidently describes his Freshman year lessons through Right Moves For Youth. When his voice trails off a little, she adds in, "I feel like it taught him, like, to be okay with who you really are. You know, who you truly are. And he doesn't try to fit in with any one but himself. He's only in competition with himself, how he can be a better person."

Everyone has a voice

Middle school years are filled with change, transitions, and growth for young people and as they find their way in the world, it's important to provide positive options for them to explore.

"You want to make sure that you focus on every child as much as possible. Right Moves For Youth gives us a different way to do that with some of our kids," says Alexander Graham Middle School Assistant Principal Loreanne Harris who volunteers her time to coordinate the program at her school.

With 1,200 children in her school, Mrs. Harris says it's impossible for CMS staff to meet all the needs that arise, academically, socially, and emotionally for every child and their family. "We can't do it all by ourselves. There is just so much need in one building, let alone all the schools that we have in CMS. It's so important for us to have the program," Harris said.

"Students come in and they're not just there to learn the academics. They're there to learn about everything socially that they're going to need in life. We have them for so many hours a day, but we can't do it all. We just can't. So, when you have different opportunities like Right Moves for Youth, for some of our students, it makes such a big impact, beyond academically, because they want to make sure that they're doing what they should be, or they feel better about doing what they're supposed to be doing."

Harris says that is part of the secret formula that leads to success. "Right Moves for Youth knows what works



because they've been doing it so long," Harris said. "We sit together, and we work with our counselors for each grade level and our administrators for each grade level, as well as our teachers, to determine which students we would like to have that opportunity to be in that program. Our School Resource Officer is part of the group when they come out once a week."

At Alexander Graham Middle, 6th, 7th, and 8th graders have access to Right Moves for Youth's weekly in-school programming and outside school experiences.

"It's about building those relationships so that students have these opportunities to be in contact with other students they probably wouldn't have the opportunity to be in contact with. They can really build those connections with other staff, and they find opportunities for leadership, just have a voice. We want to provide that space for them to be able to speak and feel like they're heard."

Many of the long-term benefits of Right Moves For Youth are immeasurable benefits that change the course of a young

person's life. Mrs. Harris reflects on one student whose parent died during the school year.

"She was in the program since sixth grade, she continued in the program in seventh grade, and she had a parent pass away. We were reaching out to her, reaching out to the family, but she's not saying much.

"It was so important to her that she met with Mrs. Ennis and the Right Moves For Youth group to talk about what she was going through and just have a very open conversation."

"Just knowing that child and how closed off they can be, that was really powerful."

Mrs. Harris has seen growth and maturity at different levels among her Right Moves For Youth students and knows the organization has a winning formula vital to her students' well-being. "Socially and emotionally, because they have this group that they are talking through different issues as they come up. But also behaviorally, because different students know someone's going to be checking in and that's important to them."

Life changing results measured beyond numbers

"Everything gets measured," says John Bragg III, a financial advisor for more than 30 years. "If you're looking at the quarterly result, Bank of America or Nvidia, you get measured. And I think it can be harder in an organization where we don't point to exact results." Often donors and corporate sponsors seek numerical data on results. While increased graduation rates and reduced expulsions can be measured, John has experienced first-hand as a volunteer with Right Moves For Youth since the early 90s, the real outcomes are measured beyond numbers.

"A kid that did go to college as opposed to a kid that stayed in college. A kid that was able to interview for a job well thanks to Right Moves to get into a school or to get a certain job. You know, those things are course changing in someone's life."

Every Tuesday, John leaves work a little early and reports to Phillip O. Berry High School as a volunteer with Right Moves For Youth where Antwain Peay is the program specialist. "I get to talk to the kids one-off here and there. 'How's work going? What's your resume look like?' Some brought their resumes in and I've helped them brush it up a little bit. That has been something where I felt like I did make a bit of a difference."

Frida Guerroro-Ochoa is a testament to how mentors move the dial just enough for life-long impact. Of 2,400 students, Frida is the only Levine Scholarship winner in Charlotte winning a \$115,000 scholarship to attend UNC-Charlotte. As a participant of Right Moves For Youth since her freshman year, John Bragg is part of her journey. "Mr. B has been a great influence in my life. From the very beginning, he has shown how much he cares. He would constantly ask me about my college application process, academic record, extracurricular involvement, and would ask for updates on any college or scholarship news. He would listen, encourage me, and offer support any way he could. He shared resources on where I could find more scholarship opportunities. Mr. B always believed in me, showed up when he could, genuinely cared, supported me, and provided encouraging words."

It's suggested that children and young adults have at least five adults in their life who provide a healthy, supportive, and encouraging relationship. "The schools are growing. Our community is growing. And our donations also really need to follow that same pace. It's hard being a young person and figuring life out without examples and support and help and resources," he said. Donations and support fuel Right



Moves For Youth and allow the organization to provide trained adult mentors to meet with students once a week for hour-long sessions. Mentors provide guidance and support to help students develop the skills and knowledge they need to succeed academically, socially, and emotionally. "Everybody starts somewhere. But with the positive encouragement and reminders to do the right thing, make good decisions among your peers and within your family, everyone can move forward with that," John said.

For students like Frida, whose parents immigrated from Honduras, there were extra barriers. "Coming from an immigrant and hardworking family has pushed me to seek for opportunities that many others cannot have. There were several challenges and sacrifices along the way, but looking at the end goal and countless possibilities lying ahead of me is what always kept me going. It is in the overcoming of the obstacles that I realized that I was and I am capable," she said. "Having adults in my life like Mr. B is really beneficial in the sense that I know I have someone there to support and encourage me. He always brings positivity into any conversation and tries to help however he can. I know that if I have questions, exciting news, or am seeking for opportunities that Mr. B will gladly be there. Many times I can motivate and push myself towards opportunities but it is a great feeling to know there is someone who will celebrate your accomplishments, believes in you, and will guide you."

John concurs. "Just pointing them in the right direction and giving them that little encouragement to head in the right direction. And Right Moves For Youth has a proven track record of helping kids make good decisions."






